A mere seconds, yes seconds, before we hit the 'Go' button on this last issue of 2021 we received confirmation from the **Heritage Fund** www.heritagefund.org.uk that our recent application for additional funding had been approved and we will shortly be in receipt of a further **£76,900.00** in addition to our original grant of £980,00.00 of 2018. This now brings the total HF grant to **£1,056,900.00**.

The additional funding will cover a range of requirement from maintenance to staffing and a shed-load of other stuff. If you really would like to know chapter-and-verse then we will be happy to give details, but for now we would simply like to revel in the sheer exhilaration in receiving the extra funding that will go a long, long way to ensuring the job will finally be done.

Our unbridled thanks to the Heritage Fund and to our fundraising team fronted by Jacqui Watson who helped prepare the ground and provide the compelling case that we really are worth it. We have only just received the letter and are still digesting it but, as always, we wanted you, our loyal supporters to hear the news first.

Philosophy corner



Stephen Pollock-Hill, Chairman and MD at Nazeing Glass Works Ltd in Broxbourne and a 'glass man' down to his bootstraps has contacted us with plans for a Big Event. He says: *'We are planning another 'Hot Glass Day' with Andy McConnell (of Antiques Roadshow fame - Ed). There are only 50 places for the opportunity to visit the company that has the oldest traceable pedigree back to 1612. Founded by Sir Edward Zouche, formerly an Elizabethan courtier, then owned by The Duke of Buckingham, who grew up as a stepbrother to the future Charles II, adopted by the Royal Family when his father was murdered in 1628. George Ravenscroft worked for the last 3 years of his life at this Vauxhall Glass Works and is buried not far away in Barnet. Also a mystery world famous person worked there for half a day, then collapsed and fainted with exhaustion. All will be revealed on the day.'*
