GlassCuts; a life

This brainteaser has been sent to us by reader Catherine Adie ...



When my father retired in approx 1970 he used his monetary retirement gift to purchase a beautiful vase from Tudor Crystal that had been engraved by a young man who had recently completed his apprenticeship at the firm. There is a signature on the item which I cannot read; the best guess I can make at it is S Crannage. Would your records of people who have been engravers give me an answer? We have established that the date inscribed on the vase is 1979 which would match with the year my father retired. He was 55 when he retired after 25 years in the police force and as he was born in 1924 the date of his retirement would indeed have been November 1979.

The vase measures 8" (20.4cm) tall and 5" (12.7cm) wide at widest point. I know the 'young man' remained working with Tudor Crystal and once, when I visited the museum circa 2008 to show my daughter where the vase originated from, the man who had engraved it was actually in the museum building so had probably remained in the area during his working life. I believe the employees in the then Tudor Crystal shop at the factory told my family that the young man was one of a pair of brothers, possibly twins, who had recently trained there. I would be most grateful if you could furnish me with their names and any other information.'
