On the map

It must be the thick end of ten years or more now since I first met Rory Walsh of the Royal Geographical Society (with IBG) https://www.rgs.org and collaborated with him on a guided walk along the Stourbridge Canal. He graciously based the walk on my 2010 book *Jewels on the Cut; an exploration of the Stourbridge Canal and the local glass industry* and kindly updated it when a heavily revised *JoC (II)* arrived in 2017. In the intervening seven years much water had, quite literally, flowed under the bridge, not least the formative transition of a certain derelict glassworks into a world class museum that was by then on its way towards the reality of it opening to the public in 2022. I was really rather chuffed with all this and I am delighted to say the walk is still up there at: https://www.discoveringbritain.org/activities/west-midlands/walks/stourbridge-canal.html

Now, to cut to the chase. *Geographical* is the monthly magazine of (RGS-IBG). It carries, *inter alia*, articles that offer a flavour of a hugely comprehensive series of walks and encourages readers to try them out for themselves. Rory informs me that he is working on further developing the Stourbridge Canal walk by way of a forthcoming feature for *Geographical* and is aiming to highlight the town's glass making heritage including, of course, the opening of Stourbridge Glass Museum.

I am grateful to Rory for offering us advance notification of his intentions so I do not propose stealing his thunder other than to say this will be a substantial piece in one of the most prestigious geographical periodicals in the land. If anything is going to help cement the synergy between our unique inland waterways and our equally unique glassmaking history - an amalgam that has been close to my own heart for quite some time - then here it is in spades.

Details will appear in *GC* in due course but I mention it now in recognition of the support that has been given to us by RGS (with IBG) from the earliest days of our Grand Project. My particular thanks also go to Rory Walsh himself, not only as an advocate of BGF but who has as a consequence of our collaborations also become a valued personal friend. Thanks, Rory.

John and Alan Cranage are identical twins brothers, both brilliant artists and very talented glass engravers, who worked at Tudor. I believe they were there until the factory closed around 1990. Alan continued in the glass trade but John went into another trade'.

We have, of course, informed Catherine who is delighted the mystery is solved. Success once more, thanks to our learned readership and The Power of GlassCuts.

* Kevin Marsden and David Bain, co-authors of Colne Point; its history, people and wildlife, have sent us a real brainteaser for which they would appreciate help from our readership. Kevin says:

'Hello, I wonder if someone in your organisation may be able to give us a steer as to where we may be able to access information in regard to the Glass Industry in Kent 1930's to 1960's? I and my coauthor are compiling a history of a Nature Reserve known as Colne Point St. Osyth, Essex. Large volumes of sands and gravel were removed over many years from the beach at a site known as Lee Wick. Barges were run ashore, loaded and floated off, with material mostly going to help construction of roads in London and later Ford Dagenham Works.

However, and this is most interesting, in a recent interview with an octogenarian who's memory was razor sharp he mentioned that material from the beach was shipped to Queenborough, Isle of Sheppey in Kent for use in the glass industry. I have commenced an online search but thus far have drawn a blank. Any help or suggestions as to the history of this industry or search areas would be greatly appreciated'.

Editor's note: Just remind me again about the Power of GlassCuts? By an amazing coincidence I was undertaking some research into the Huguenot diaspora recently when I happened across a Doctoral thesis The Glass Industry in the Woodland Economy of the Weald by Colin Jeremy Clark https://etheses.whiterose.ac.uk/15153/1/485886.pdf. We have forwarded this together with contact details for the waterways side of the enquiry to Kevin but the quest does not end here and we are confident our readership can furnish more information.
