CGS @ SGM

As widely advertised, not least here in *GlassCuts*, our friends over at the Contemporary Glass Society www.cgs.or.uk are celebrating their 25th anniversary in some style, with a special exhibition at Stourbridge Glass Museum. Pam Reekie, CGS Administrator and Fundraiser, tells us:

'To celebrate our quarter century promoting contemporary glass, we are delighted to be showcasing a special celebratory exhibition entitled, 'CGS at 25: Past, Present, the Future' from 23rd July through to 30th October 2022 and encompassing the duration of the International Festival of Glass.'

'The last 25 years have seen dramatic changes and advances - political, technological, environmental, and social. This exhibition tells the history of both CGS and the world which is reflected by glass artwork covering a range of techniques selected from the past 25 years from 25 of the United Kingdom's greatest glass artists.'

'Artists represented in the exhibition include founding members of the CGS such as Peter Layton of London Glassblowing fame, the legendary Keith Cummings - who has taken kiln formed glass to new heights; renowned casters David Reekie and Colin Reid, artist and musician Alison Kinnaird MBE plus Catherine Hough, Sally Fawkes and the beautifully engraved work of Katharine Coleman MBE.'

'This roll call of excellence continues with the unique technical skills of Anthony Scala, Gilles Jones' sumptuous bowls, the lost wax technique used by Angela Jarman plus Max Jacquard and Bruno Romanelli. Artists from the middle period feature Cathryn Shilling, the lampworking of Ayako Tani, the story telling of James Maskrey and Jo Mitchell. In addition there are Nancy Sutcliffe's exquisite engravings, the collaboration of techniques used by Nina Casson McGarva plus Frans Wesselman, Jeff Zimmer and Keiko Mukaide. Finally there are the emerging stars of the future; the pâte de verre of Joshua Kerley, Elliot Walker (winner of Netflix's "Blown Away") and Chris Day (winner of the commission sponsored by CGS and SGM.) Finally we introduce our graduate winner for 2021, Erica Poyser, as a clarion call for the next generation of contemporary glass artists.'

BGF is delighted to be hosting this gathering of talent and in offering our congratulations on their first 25 years we thank the CGS for their consideration in making us their chosen venue for this show. More at admin@cgs.org.uk
